1976

The Pharmacy School moves into its existing building as the Medical School moves across to the QMC Hospital Site. The School's home was opened in 1970 as a temporary home for the Medical School.

1982

A reorganisation of Pharmacy Education at Nottingham results in Pharmacology teaching being transferred to the Physiology and Pharmacology Department in the Medical School. Three pharmacology academics, Steve Hill, Bob Mason and Ivan Stockley move across to the Medical School. This transfer offers unique opportunity for physiology and pharmacology teaching in years 1 and 2 to be given to joint classes of pharmacy, medical and nursing students.

1985

Professor Barrie Bycroft becomes Head of School on a rotational basis. Himself and Professor Bob Davis continued to lead the School through to today.

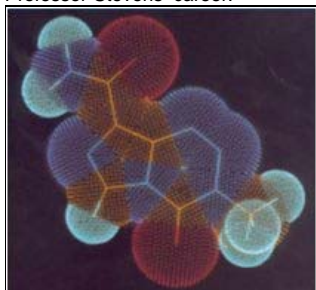
1989

Malcolm Stevens (Left) with co-workers Sandy Slovach, John Hunt and Harvey Dean in 1962.

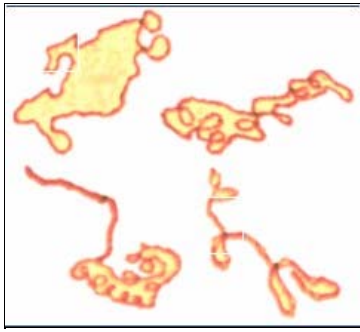
Below, a molecular model of **temzolamide**, a molecule whose history traces back to the early work in Professor Stevens' career.



1993

During a phase of continued expansion of the School's research portfolio, the new Laboratory of Biophysics and Surface Analysis opens.

1996

The School is awarded the top rating of 5* on the Research Assessment Exercise. This places the School as the top research centre for Pharmacy in the country and is the springboard for ambitious expansion plans.
